Dear Parents and Carers,



The Summer Term has got off to a flying start! We've had hot summer's days and really cold rainy ones! The children bounced back into school after the Easter break, energised, happy and ready to work hard again! Last Sunday, I attended a church service at St. Christopher's with Mrs Sadler, our Head Boy, Head Girl and their deputies to commemorate the centenary of the end of the Great War. The service was a dedication and blessing of the newly restored flag pole, cross and 12000 poppies which are cascading down from the top of the church tower. Our children made 1600 of the 12000 poppies. They look wonderful and I encourage you to visit and see them for yourselves.

### EYFS

The children in early years have been busy learning all about St George this week. They have especially loved re-enacting the story of when he fought the dragon and rescued the princess! They have made castles, flags, dragons and re-written the story. Last week our topic was the story of the Hungry Caterpillar. We talked about healthy eating, made our own books, ordered the days of the week and made caterpillar art. We are learning about lifecycles and we have our own class caterpillars and tadpoles to observe. Next week our topic will be minibeasts.



### KS1

Year 1 has been using the story 'Pumpkin Soup' as a focus for English this week. They have looked closely at how making one adaptation can change the rest of the story. In maths they have been consolidating their knowledge of numbers to 100. The science focus has been germination and the children have designed their own seed packets with instructions on the back. They have made a comic strip of the story of St George. Next week the growing theme will continue and the children will be inventing their own stories.



Year 2 children have been planting bulbs and seeds this week as part of their growing plants topic. They are underway in making changes to the story Saving Sinbad and next week will be writing their own versions. In maths they have been working hard to learn to tell the time (quarter past, quarter to and half past). They have all managed to understand the concept but we would appreciate your help in continuing to practise this with them at home. In RE they have been learning about what is important to Muslim children and will continue learning about Islam next week. Also next week the children will be experimenting with cress to discover what conditions plants need to grow healthy.

## LKS2

We have been very busy in LKS2 since returning from the Easter holidays. We have started our topic on the Ancient Greeks and the children are beginning to know where ancient Greece is in the timeline of history, identify where Greece is in the world and know some of the main events that happened during this period. In English, year 3 have been focussing their reading and writing on the 'Firework Maker's Daughter' by Phillip Pullman and the children are really enjoying the story. Year 4 have been learning about the twelve labours of Heracles (Roman Hercules) in preparation for writing a 13<sup>th</sup> labour in which Heracles will encounter a creature that they have invented. They have plenty of ideas they can draw on after hearing the myths of the many-headed Hydra and the vicious Mares of King Diomedes, among other creatures. Sharing any Greek myths you know or reading them with your children would be a great way to support their learning in this topic. In science, year 3 are coming to the end of a unit of work on magnets and springs and will soon be learning about light and shadows. Year 4 have continued learning about electricity. They have made electric circuits to light a light bulb and looked a range of circuits to decide if they are complete or incomplete, before explaining why. In maths, Year 3 have been learning how to use the 24 hour clock and this week have focussed on fractions. Year 4 have been increasing their knowledge of geometry, learning about the different types of triangles, quadrilaterals and angles.

## UKS2

The children have started their exciting new topic about Spies and Detectives. This Monday saw the children solve the heinous crime of fish-nabbing in which the year 6 fish and frog were cruelly stolen! Fortunately the criminal behind the theft was foolish enough to leave finger prints on the £500 ransom note, as well as DNA evidence and footprints leaving the scene. Throughout the day children, many dressed in excellent detective attire, investigated the evidence: the footprints, the DNA, fingerprints and the Victorian 'science' of craniology which involved some rather disturbing brains made by Dr Glover. Linked to this unit children have begun to be Geography detectives by investigating the local area and history detectives by analysing how we can find out about the past and historical people through artefacts that are left behind. In RE Year 5 are studying different creeds and what unites us and in Y6 we have been studying Buddhism including the Four Noble Truths and the Eightfold Path to happiness.
