Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope you've all been enjoying the fantastic run of warm weather we've been having lately. The children have played nicely together on our school field at lunchtimes and it has been a pleasure to see so many varied games and activities such as cricket with Mr Moore, football, hula-hooping, javelin throwing and in some cases, just chilling in small groups, on the grass in the sunshine. I hope some of you will make it to the band night tomorrow evening at Grayshott Village Hall. My Band will go on stage at 7.45pm and the funds raised from the evening will be split between St Bartholomew's, Shottermill Junior, Witley Infants and Grayswood Junior.

### EYFS

The children in Early Years have thoroughly enjoyed their topic of animals this week, with the highlights definitely being visits from various pets! We have met two teachers' dogs, Emily's rabbit, Evie's chicken and Morty's armadillo! The class caterpillars have now turned into chrysalides, which has caused lots of awe and wonder amongst the children. The story of Dear Zoo has inspired the children to make books with lift-up flaps and we have been pleased with the progress in writing all children are making so far this term. Next week we will be celebrating the royal wedding with our very own wedding topic. We are planning to hold our own mock wedding so if anyone has a boy's suit we can borrow we would be very grateful.



### KS1

Year one have fully immersed themselves in writing instructions this week. Through the story of Pumpkin Soup they have been learning imperative (bossy) verbs and have followed and written instructions themselves. They loved following these instructions today by making their own soup (sadly, pumpkins are not in season so it was delicious butternut squash soup instead!) In maths they have been adding one and two digit numbers and practising number bonds to 10 and 20. Please could you reinforce this at home by practising all the ways to make 20 eg  $16+4$ . In RE the children have been exploring Judaism by learning about Hanukkah and synagogues. Year two have been exploring the life cycle of plants this week with plenty of practical work involving planting seeds and bulbs and designing their own plant experiments. In RE they have been learning the different names for Allah. Maths has been a focus on the four calculation operations and next week they will be exploring maths word problems. This is what the children have for homework, but we would appreciate it if you could continue to give them verbal word problems in your spare time. We are very proud of the children with their 'Special Agent Training' at the moment, and they have been working very hard so please find time to have fun and enjoy the sunshine this weekend. A special mention for Ellie Bray in South Africa class who is the first Key Stage one pupil to gain a pen licence for excellent handwriting!



## LKS2

It was lovely to welcome so many parents to our open afternoon last week to join with their children in celebrating their work. After a lovely long weekend break in the sun the children have continued to work hard this week. In English, Year 3 have planned their play scripts based on 'The Firework Maker's Daughter' and have started writing them. Year 4 have written endings for the 13<sup>th</sup> labour of Heracles and will be publishing their stories before moving on to write shape poems about the Cretan Minotaur. In maths, year 3 are finding fractions of amounts whilst year 4 have been plotting coordinates and translating shapes on a grid. Learning to read time is important for both year groups and you can really support your children in their learning by practising both analogue and digital time at home. In science, year 3 have carried out an investigation into how reflective different materials are in a unit about light. Year 4 have completed a unit on electricity this week and will start a new unit on the three states of matter next week. On Thursday and Friday this week, year 4 completed level 1 of the Surrey Bikeability course which teaches them how to ride a bike in a controlled manner, helping to keep them safe on the roads.

## UKS2

The children have really been getting into their Spies and Detectives unit over the past two weeks. Year 5 have been writing about the Marwell Manor Mystery and are trying to come up with theories about who committed the murder. Similarly in Year 6 the children have investigated a real unsolved historical mystery – The Murder at Kirk O'Field involving the death of Lord Darnley, the second husband of Mary, Queen of Scots. From investigating and debating the evidence, including letters between Mary and Queen Elizabeth I we came to the conclusion that the Scottish Queen was indeed guilty of the murder. Sorry Mary! Year 5 children really enjoyed their trip to Winchester Science Centre – there were lots of hands-on activities and a workshop on Rockets and Forces where the children made a rocket and used water pressure to fit into the sky. Year 6 have continued their investigations into evolution, finding out about inheritance and adaptation. Year 6 are now coming to the end of their SATS revision and are now feeling justifiably confident about sitting their tests next week. We wish them the best of luck!
